

This is an annotated list of basic, selected print and online research tools that cover the discipline of international relations. All the sources described in this guide are located in the USC Library system. To search for books, conference proceedings, and other monographs associated with international migration and refugees, search HOMER, the online library catalog. For periodical articles concerning this topic in scholarly journals, consult the section in this guide entitled, "Indexes and Abstracts." Library research guides covering international political issues, including *Africa, East Asia, Latin America, Russia and Eurasia*, and *The Middle East* are also available. These guides include descriptions of resources that will help you find specific information on a particular country, world region, or non-governmental organization. They are located in the VKC Library along with many others. Please consult a reference librarian if you need further research assistance.

As the twentieth century closes, globalization is reshaping the lives of all the world's people. Driven by advances in communication and transportation and rapidly expanding networks of business activity, globalization has made us dependent on people in far corners of the world in ways that were inconceivable at the beginning of this century. This work examines the moral issues and questions that result from the process of globalization. Topics include disease and pollution, the authority of national governments, and international trade and global distributive justice. This new edition takes into account the dramatic changes in the world since the first edition was published in 1993. Drawing on the breadth of the first edition, this major new edition reflects the changing world with a reassessment of many of the core themes of the Companion, and new articles on the people, concepts, and events that have shaped the world since 1993. The second edition includes biographies of Kofi Annan, Tony Blair, Bill Clinton, and Gerhard Schroder; articles on events such as the Rwandan Genocide and the war in Kosovo; and coverage of international trade developments such as NAFTA and the World Trade Organization. Eighty-seven of the 672 articles in the Second Edition are completely new; most others are thoroughly revised. This edition also features a substantial new set of articles, a dozen essays on critical issues written by influential figures. Recognizing the importance of including varying viewpoints, the editors have commissioned these essays to provide an informed and often passionate debate on controversial topics. Discussions include Lani Guinier and Glenn Loury on Affirmative Action; Francis Fukuyama and Milton Fisk on the Limits of Liberal Democracy; and Lloyd Axworthy and John Bolton on the United Nations. The contributors discuss nearly every nation in the world, including extensive information on institutions, political parties, leaders, and the sources of political mobilization and conflict. The volume also includes biographies of more than seventy-five political leaders and thinkers who have shaped the contemporary political world. Articles include detailed discussions of critical historical developments and events, concepts, international law, and organizations. The Companion is an accessible, timely, and comprehensive reference that captures the complexity of contemporary world affairs.

Nagel, Stuart S., ed. *Handbook of Global Political Policy*. New York: Marcel Dekker, 2000.

The *Handbook of Global Political Policy* utilizes a cross-national, cross-policy approach to examine the public policy of six different regions around the world. Combining actual and theoretical perspectives, this expansive reference compares and presents nonideological resolutions to current political conditions worldwide. With contributions by over 30 international policy experts, the Handbook addresses the dilemma of multiculturalism, determines elite acceptance as a key factor in the survival of Russian democracy, postulates causes for the breakdown and default of the Indian government, offers a current perspective on the role of the People's Liberation Army in China's democratization process, details shared concepts of leadership in China and Taiwan, highlights cases of donor-assisted democratization in Africa, and recommends paths of action for international donors, explains why the federal republics of Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia had disproportionately greater numbers of critics than defenders, considers the effects of Brazilian institutional arrangements promoting state reform, and discusses campaign finance reform in the United States. Supplemented with over 1200 literature references, tables, and drawings, the Handbook is an insightful resource in a case study format.

The end of the Cold War, which was in many ways the great simplifier of international affairs, has fundamentally changed the character of world politics and introduced dangerous new developments and processes. This change is fully reflected in this dictionary. Extensively cross-referenced and with a select bibliography to aid further study, this comprehensive overview of contemporary international relations

Provides definitions on a variety of concepts, organizations, movements, conflicts, treaties, historical and geographical references and doctrines, as well as terminology that spans diplomatic, military, legal and environmental issues. With a framework that covers the period from the French Revolution of 1789 right up to the present, and includes 1500 entries, *International Relations: A Concise Companion* gives the reader both the theory and the historical context, and provides an invaluable support to study. Detailed and succinct, it is fully cross-referenced and includes details of further reading and websites. It is an essential reference book for anyone seeking a better understanding of world affairs and the background to contemporary realities.

From abatement (a legal justification for forceful intervention by an outside power in a country's internal affairs) to the Zulu wars of the 19th century, some 6000 entries on terms, people, places, organizations, and events of world interstate relations are presented. Although the major events from world history are included, the focus is centered on the role of the United States in the world. The editors eschew theoretical language, but do include entries on major theoretical schools of thought and terms. The volume is intended for undergraduates. Each of the four volumes contains the same 29 maps illustrating major world conflicts and empires, including maps on the early crusades, the worldwide slave trade, the growth of Russia, Japanese expansion in Asia, U.S. intervention in Latin America, and the Gulf War. The final volume includes a select bibliography and an index for the entire set.

Osmańczyk, Edmund Jan. *Encyclopedia of the United Nations and International Agreements*. 4 vols. Edited and revised by Anthony Mango. 3rd ed. New York: Routledge, 2003.

This new edition is the most comprehensive and detailed reference book on the United Nations. It demystifies the workings of this multifaceted world body with accessible articles on every country, organization, office, and department within the United Nations as well as on every non-governmental organization, committee, and joint effort (such as peacekeeping operations) that is in any way connected to the United Nations. It also defines every international treaty since the founding of the League of Nations and gives lengthy quotations or the full text of many treaties, depending on their importance. The extensive cross-referencing will help users navigate the many acronyms and multiple names of organizations, treaties, and meetings, and a thorough, analytical index will provide another access point.

Continuing *Keesing's Contemporary Archives*, this resource track world events culled from the world's press and information services. *Keesing's* distills political, economic and social events into concise, detailed reports. Events are edited down to essential information. Coverage includes issues such as assassinations and their consequences, acts of terrorism, coups, elections and referendums with results including listings of new cabinet members, major political appointments, economic trends and accords, national budgets and deficits, and reports on actions taken by international organizations. The front page of any issue of *Keesing's Record of World Events* gives the user an overview of the events covered in that issue. Each issue is indexed by country, international organization, and significant international events. In addition, two cumulative name and subject indexes are included with each annual volume. Published weekly, this is a rich source of information on current and historical affairs.

The Digital National Security Archive provides access to the most comprehensive collection available of significant primary documents central to US foreign and military policy since 1945. Nearly 40,000 of the most important, declassified documents—totaling more than 250,000 pages— are included in the database. Many are published now for the first time. The National Security Archive is a non-profit research institute and library in Washington, D.C., which provides unprecedented public access to declassified government documents obtained through extensive use of the US Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). DNSA is comprised of fifteen collections, each focused on a single topic: Afghanistan: The Making of US Policy, 1973-1990; The Berlin Crisis, 1958-1962; The Cuban Missile Crisis, 1962; El Salvador: The Making of US Policy, 1977-1984; Iran: The Making of US Policy, 1977-1980; The Iran-Contra Affair: The Making of a Scandal; Iraqgate: Saddam Hussein, U.S. Policy and the Prelude to the Persian Gulf War, 1980-1994; Nicaragua: The Making of US Policy, 1978-1990; The Philippines: US Policy during the Marcos Years, 1965-1986; Presidential Directives on National Security from Truman to Clinton; South Africa: The Making of US Policy, 1962-1989; The Soviet Estimate: U.S. Analysis of the Soviet Union, 1947-1991; The US Intelligence Community, 1947-1989; US Military Uses of Space, 1945-1991; and, US Nuclear

Non-Proliferation Policy, 1945-1991. Each collection contains a diverse range of policy documents including presidential directives, memos, diplomatic dispatches, meeting notes, independent reports, briefing papers, White House communications, email, confidential letters and other secret material. Additionally, contextual and reference supplements are provided for each collection, including general introductory material, a chronology, glossary and bibliography. Documents have been selected and identified by leading scholars in each of the topic areas covered and have been indexed to permit item and page-level searching across more than 20 combinable fields. In its totality, DNSA offers the most powerful research and teaching tool available in the area of US foreign policy, intelligence and security issues during this pivotal period of twentieth-century history.

The statutory function of the NSC is to advise the President with respect to the integration of domestic, foreign, and military policies relating to national security. However, the mere words by which the NSC was established do not begin to indicate how the NSC has evolved as a keyBsometimes the keyBforeign policy-making arm of the President. The documentary record of the work and influence of the NSC has been elusive, mainly because the government has published very little NSC material. The publication by UPA of substantial numbers of documents of the NSC is therefore important news for those who want to evaluate accurately the NSC's first four decades. The National Security Council series collects and publishes all of the formerly classified NSC papers that have been released through Freedom of Information Act requests. The broad range of documents, including formal policy papers, progress reports, background documents "P" files, "Mill" papers, National Security Council actions, national security action memoranda, and national security study memoranda, gives researchers an comprehensive, inside view of the highest level of foreign policy decision making in the Executive Office of the President. Documents of the National Security Council contains several types of formerly classified materials, which together form a "paper trail" of the making of U.S. national security policies between 1947 and 1990. Some of these materials are Formal Policy Papers written by the NSC staff, these papers are distributed to members of the NSC for review and comment. National Security Council Intelligence Directives outline the organization, procedures, and relationships of the many intelligence organizations within the federal government.

This service is the best place to look for information published by and about Congress from 1970 to the present. With *CIS Congressional Universe*, researchers can: pinpoint expert testimony on the leading issues of the day; tap authoritative sources of statistics, projections, and analyses; discover a law's intent by tracing its legislative history; gauge congressional attitudes toward current topics; find out how members of Congress voted on legislation; investigate the finances of members of Congress; monitor legislation and public policy on almost any topic; review the federal regulations that implement legislation; and learn the makeup and mission of congressional committees. The service provides a seamless link to the full range of legislative and public policy resources, including hearing transcripts and submitted testimony from 1988 forward; committee reports from 1989 forward; bills—all versions of legislation introduced from 1989 forward; bill tracking reports from 1989 forward; selected committee prints from 1995 forward; congressional documents from 1995 forward; the *Congressional Record* from 1985 forward; and the *Federal Register* from 1980 forward. The vast range of subject matter on *CIS Congressional Universe* encompasses topics in public policy, history, sociology, political science, technology and society, and more. With links to related web sites, this system also enhances the user's ability to explore the legislative scene even further. The system is thoroughly cross-referenced with controlled vocabulary that lets users find information from virtually any starting point. Researchers can find information by subject, source committee, bill number, session of Congress, government document number, publication number, title, witness name and affiliation, public law number (for legislative histories), and date. Use this database, for example, to look at the expression of emotions by legislators on the floor of Congress as transcribed in the *Congressional Record*.

It also provides basic information, economic indicators and maps for all countries, links to other useful web sites, and a schedule of coming events. In addition it indexes a limited number of journals. The content may be accessed in a number of ways: through the home pages, which allow the user to see what is contained in a category; through alphabetical indices (author, subject, title, and institution); and, through the search engine which allows users to search for files by fields (author, subject, title, date, and content area) and/or by keywords. The schedule of events is broken down by month, and the links and resources are organized by region and by area of interest (e.g. media). In addition to

linking to over 160 related sites from this section, you can also access the home pages of each of the contributing institutions from within the section where its papers appear.
