## PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The University of Southern California (USC) Keck School of Medicine will celebrate the 51<sup>st</sup> Anniversary of the Annual USC Refresher Course in Medicine by holding two side-by-side courses. This arrangement offers participants the option of selecting from different topics in General Medicine or Women's Health that are presented simultaneously. This enables attendees to customize their learning to their own needs.

**Needs Assessment** - Each year we strive to make the quality and relevance of the educational experience the best ever. Our faculty have systematically reviewed the medical literature in each of our specialty areas and in general medicine over the last 18 months. Faculty presentations and discussions will focus upon important research studies and discoveries that are relevant to practicing physicians. We have also studied the lists of topics suggested by thousands of physicians who have attended our CME courses during the past 12 months to guide our selection of the areas to be included in our formal presentations.

**General Medicine** – This program, now in its 51<sup>st</sup> year, will provide up-to-date, evidence-based information that is intended to fill gaps in physician knowledge and improve patient care. Specialists in cardiology, dermatology, infectious disease, neurology, oncology, obstetrics and gynecology, endocrinology and diabetes, ophthalmology, rheumatology, and family and sports medicine will present practical and clinically relevant discussions of interest to practicing internists, family physicians and generalists. Our course is designed to facilitate interactive discussion of cases, and our faculty will be available for individual discussions with participants. This year we will use an electronic audience response system to facilitate interaction and discussions. Current preventive services will be reviewed with each appropriate topic.

### Objectives

At the conclusion of the program the participant should be able to:

- discuss current recommendations and guidelines regarding the treatment of patients with dyslipidemia, hypertension, CHF, and coronary artery disease and angina pectoris;
- recognize and treat common dermatologic conditions, and advise patients regarding cosmetic dermatologic treatments and surgery, photodynamic therapy, and gene therapy;
- describe rational antibiotic administration, and current management of herpes zoster, influenza, and MRSA;
- review the current prevention of stroke and TIA, and management of tremor, epilepsy, back pain, and restless legs syndrome;
- discuss prevention and management of DVT and pulmonary embolism, screening and early management of prostate and lung cancer, various bladder symptoms, and pain management in cancer patients;
- recognize, evaluate and treat patients with common sports/overuse injuries such as plantar fasciitis, knee pain, and elbow and shoulder injuries;
- discuss current diagnosis and management of fibromyalgia, osteoporosis, osteoarthritis, hip disease, and low back pain.
- prevent, recognize and manage type 2 diabetes mellitus, hyperthyroidism, thyroiditis, and use insulin appropriately;
- recognize and manage diabetic retinopathy and macular degeneration with ophthalmologic consultation.

**Women's Health** - There have been rapid advances in the diagnosis and treatment of conditions and diseases affecting women. Some estimates place the prevalence of female sexual dysfunction at almost 50%. Most clinicians however receive little if any training in the identification, classification or treatment of these disorders. The diagnosis and management of common breast disorders will address the medicolegal threat to practicing clinicians who care for women. As the proportion of menopausal women increases, clinicians will face the question of hormone therapy with greater frequency. Dealing with confusing and conflicting information is now an everyday part of menopause management, and will be directly addressed with the current best evidence. Guidelines for contraception care for women with underlying medical or gynecologic problems such as headaches, diabetes, obesity, PMS, menorrhagia and pain will be covered. This particularly vulnerable population has special needs for which new interventions have been evaluated and/or approved. The Women's Health Program is designed to provide health care professionals with current methodologies for diagnosis and treatment of their female patients and provide necessary information to bridge the gap in knowledge and performance.

### Objectives

At the conclusion of the program the participant should be able to

- effectively counsel the perimenopausal woman regarding effective interventions for relieve of symptoms and prevention of disease;
- chose among available contraceptive options to tailor a plan that fits the needs of women with special medical problems;
- recognize risk factors for decreased female sexual satisfaction;
- describe management of a palpable breast mass.
