"Transcripts"

I was a DCI student in the six week course and I need to have my transcripts sent to my local university. What should I do?

You can call USC's transcript office at (213) 740-4080 and they will guide you in the right direction. This is only for alumni who have taken the six week course. For one week seminar students, you only have transcripts from USC if

you paid for the USC tuition which was undoubtedly more expensive than the POST training tuition. Call us to find out which tuition you or your department paid.

While I took the six week course, I did not register for the additional units you offered. I'm sorry I didn't take them then and I really would like to register for them now. Can I do it?
